This has been a busy, but constructive year for us. We have seen a few personnel changes in 2022, including multiple supply pastors, who have all been a blessing, helping us to continue our community outreach and maintain the spiritual health of our congregation.

We began 2022 with a new supply pastor, Mark Stryjak, who replaced Pastor Christian through the end of May. We dealt with a number of challenges in the wake of Pastor Christian's departure, but what we found was a strong, resilient team of employees, volunteers and council members, who well work together and meet each challenge that comes along. I couldn't be more pleased to have this incredible group of people.

Most teams/committees have been active and growing, as you will see in their annual reports. Remember large or small cartridges will gladly be accepted, just put them in the box in the lower narthex. The money earned helps to pay for more office supplies and more printer cartridges. When you consider all the bulletins and the newsletters that are printed for the church services and newsletter mailings this past year, this was a big help. Keep em' coming...

While the weather was cooler than we would have liked, the sun did finally come out around lunch time to help warm us up a bit. The Lower Milford Festival in September was a **Profit \$860.00** Thank you to Joan & Rodney Slota, Ken and Alice Debus, Robin & Marty Klobosits and Debbie Koder. We sold 38 cups of Cabbage and Noodles made with homemade noodles prepared by Marty and Robin Klobosits, which was sold out by 1:00 pm. Delicious!! We had some pre-yard sale items available and some very delicious baked goods. Special thank you to Joan and Rodney for donating all the proceeds from the sales of the beautiful handmade copper ornaments. These are a huge attraction to our booth.

Our Christmas gift card fundraiser sold \$21,510.00 in Gift Cards, which earned us a **Total Profit of \$1133.85 in Gift Card Sales!!!** This money will be used towards our fuel bill. **Thank you** to everyone who placed an order for the gift cards. This will return again in October 2023.

Thrivent Choice Program - Total Profit of \$ 972.00 Chestnut Hill United Church of Christ is now enrolled in Thrivent Choice[®]. These are some of the future projects we are considering:

 - 1. Due to the heavy snow storm in 2021-2022, the weight of the snow rested on gutters and pulled the gutters away from the building on the north side. The repair was completed in June. Cost to repair was \$3513.86. Our insurance company only paid \$1431.00







2. In August it was noticed that the gutter on the south side was also pulling away from the building, due to the heavy snow of 2021-2022. This was repaired in November at a cost of \$3304.17.





3. Our parking lot was resealed and line repainted Nov. It was done previously in 2019.

We have a lot of large cracks that were not able to be filled, we will repair those in the spring 2023.

Personnel Team Annual Report 2022

The Personnel Committee was very fortunate to have Curt Heck agree to become a member of this committee early this year. We are so glad to have you Curt!.

The end of 2021 found Chestnut Hill Church without a Pastor due to Pastor Christian's resignation. Robin Shedlauskas was instrumental in getting Interim Pastor coverage through her contacting Rev. Mark Stryjak who provided worship leadership from Jan 1 to May 31, 2022. Thereafter, Cindy Buchter was instrumental in scheduling supply Pastor coverage for the remainder of the year through her contacting several supply Pastors and developing a worship coverage schedule as a Search Committee was being established to take responsibility for interviewing and finding a new Pastor.

The Personnel Committee then received the resignation from our church pianist, Erica Dickson, which was effective 8/21/2021. The Personnel Committee looked into advertising for this position but found this too cost prohibitive without any

money allocated for this purpose in the church budget. Subsequently an amount was added to the 2023 church budget for Personnel advertisement purposes.

In an effort to try to find music coverage, Cindy and Robin had conversations with several individuals regarding covering music each Sunday with Cindy contacting both the PNEC and PSEC to have this position listed in their newsletters, in addition to contacting the Lehigh Valley Organist's Guild. Alternative music venues had to be looked into, ie: use of a guitar in lieu of piano or organ in providing music accompaniment at services. At this time, the Personnel Committee is keeping in contact with several individuals who are willing to provide music accompaniment on an as needed basis but are unwilling to commit to a part-time musician position. This continues to be an ongoing process and we have been fortunate to have obtained music coverage since Erica left us in August, although are uncertain this can be maintained.

The Personnel Committee also completed annual evaluation reviews with Robin Klobosits, Church Secretary; Karen Billger, Church Treasurer; and Sandy Eckhart, Church Sexton.

Robin continues to be the contact person between church staff and Willoughby (the church payroll company) regarding hours worked by staff, reporting and record-keeping. As well, we are currently in the process of getting Linda Rapp set up with Willoughby's as a permanent part-time employee. Welcome Linda as our worship leader!

During this year, 2022, the Chestnut Hill Church Cemetery revised and updated their Constitution and By-Laws which was approved by the Church Council and, thereafter, the Congregation during an annual congregational meeting held the end of February 2022.

Wreaths Across America was held for the third year in a row, with many individuals participating including church members and individuals from the community. Jeff Bogert and Karen Billger were instrumental in making this year's event a success.

Cindy Buchter announced her resignation as a member at the December meeting of the Cemetery Board with Marty Klobosits being approved as her replacement. Marty will begin his tenure at the first meeting of the Cemetery Board in January 2023.

Over the course of this year there were 23 burials and purchase of 5 plots.

Purpose: To provide for the perpetual care of the cemetery grounds through designated funding, along with managing and maintaining accurate records regarding purchasing of lots for individuals, families and their given heirs, so appointed.

Goals: Continuing upkeep of the cemetery grounds to include mowing grass, weed whacking, biannual collection and removal of leftover debris on the cemetery grounds, in addition to the sale of individual and family plots with maintenance of both current and historical records as currently in possession the date of this initial Ways of Work document (9/8/2021).

STEWARDSHIP DONATION REPORT:

Chestnut Hill Church Annual Giving Report January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022

In 2022, we had 74 giving units, where a giving unit is counted as each adult member who has an offering envelope. Married couples always count as one giving unit because they will share an envelope between them. Below is the breakdown of giving, by giving units, as defined above:

Thanks to your support, we, as a church, were able to continue finding ways for our members and members of our community to worship outside of our physical worship space. We were also able to perform some necessary repairs and

maintenance to our church building while it was mostly vacant, (*please refer to Trustees report page 7, for more information on improvements and repairs*). This was all possible, thanks to folks like you. With the continued support of our family of faith, we will be able to offer so much continued help, for those in need. Without the generous giving from our church members, none of what we have done, could have been possible! Thank you and God Bless.

WOMEN WORKING WONDERS!

WWW! is Blessed to be able to help others in the community, with the help of our phenomenal CHC Family. Following are the organizations to whom we have chosen to donate this year:

Betty Lou's Pantry: the CHC congregation has generously donated \$450 towards the purchase of gift cards for the kids and seniors registered at BLP. WWW has added \$550 to that amount so a check for \$1000 will be sent to BLP from CHC.

Ukrainian family that has gotten out of Ukraine and joined family in the Solehi area. In addition to clothing and monetary donations from the congregation, WWW will be gifting them with \$50 Walmart gift cards for each of the eight family members who have successfully reached US soil, for a total of \$400.

The Kindness Project, which helps foster families, will receive (20) \$25 Amazon gift cards (total of \$500), to help foster families purchase items needed when they get their placements, sometimes in the middle of the night, at the last minute.

Victory House, which helps veterans and men in need, will receive a \$500 check to use as needed.

Turning Point, which helps women and their children escape from domestic violence, will receive \$25 Walmart and Target gift cards (total of \$500) to distribute as needed.

6th **Street Shelter**, will also receive \$25 Walmart and Target gift cards (total of \$500).

Children's Developmental Program, Quakertown, which helps developmentally challenged children and their families adjust and learn to overcome their disabilities, will receive a \$500 check to use as needed.

Holiday Hope shoebox project: we have wrapped and delivered 39 shoeboxes filled with age-appropriate items to be distributed locally; additionally three bags/boxes of extraneous items. A huge thank you to our CHC Family for their contributions.

WWW is very proud to be able to help so many in need this holiday season. We feel truly Blessed to have such a generous and loving CHC Family supporting our efforts. We look forward to continuing our fundraising projects, which allows us to continue our mission of helping others.

To try and keep everyone as safe as possible, HEPA systems are used in both the pantry and the church and while inside, everyone is required to wear a mask. Volunteers from the churches help with the shopping and transporting the food to the cars. Core volunteers manage the meat, bread and help yourself tables. Thanks to all who pitch in twice a month. Special holiday dinners: For Easter, Thanksgiving,

and Christmas, we gave out a meal which consisted of a turkey, ham or lasagna and a pie. We served 92 families for Easter, 89 families for Thanksgiving and 97 families for Christmas. We used community donations made at Giant to purchase most of the food. Thank you to Giant for delivering all the food in your Peapod truck. Girl Scout troop 637 provided many of the pies. Thanks to the girls and to Marcie Weaver for coordinating everything! Betty Lou's Pantry is the beneficiary of two large food drives – the Letter Carriers in May and the Boy Scouts in November. The letter carrier food drive yielded close to 6000 pounds. Thank you to our local letter carriers and to all the volunteers who help sort and box the food. The scouts' food drive yielded a whopping 21566 pounds. Special thanks to Matt Woodruff for coordinating all the scouts to staple 6000 flyers to bags for the letter carrier food drive and 10,000 flyers for the boy scout food drive and to sort, pack and stock all the food. Thank you to everyone who helped. The last few years we have been blessed with churches, individuals and community groups who sponsor a family for Christmas. Instead of gifts, this year we asked for monetary donations and received \$8601 which was used to purchase Walmart gift cards. Each child and senior received \$50 while the other patrons received \$25. The efforts to build a YMCA in Southern Lehigh continue. Assuming all goes well, Betty Lou's Pantry will be able to move out of our basement and into a ground level room that will house everything in one place including the food drives food, the 600 + empty boxes we store for food drives and our off-premise freezers and refrigerators. The time frame is 3 years. VOLUNTEERS Keeping the pantry stocked with food for over 300 people is an enormous job. After each distribution, the restocking crew takes inventory and then places orders at Second Harvest. Over 5000 pounds of food is loaded, unloaded and stocked on the shelves every two weeks. On the off weeks, special fill in purchases are made at various stores and stocked in the pantry. A HUGE THANK YOU goes out to the stocking crew: Alice Debus, Laura Held, Barb Leh, Cheryl Levy, Chip Minarick, Lesley Motruk, Frank Milcetich, Diane Neiermeier, Bob Shelly, Jeffery Stocker, Tim and Cindy Talaber, Chuck & Karen Talboo, and Susan Valasek. We could not do it without all of you. A VERY SPECIAL THANK YOU to Chuck and Karen Talboo for managing the whole restocking process and for the countless hours they put in at the pantry and to Tim and Bob who go to Second Harvest to make the pickups!!! Leading up to the distribution week, communications need to be sent out to coordinate all the volunteers and remind the patrons about the upcoming Saturday. Thank you to Monica Gehman for taking on this important role and for doing such an amazing job with it. We distribute on the second and fourth Saturday each month from 9-11:00. Starting before 8am tables are removed from the shed and all the boxes

of help yourself food are removed from the basement, sorted out onto the tables and then at the end of the day, repacked and returned to the basement. Sometimes there are 10 tables worth of help yourself food - food and non-food items that do not fit our 26 core items. Peter Farrell and Roy Raub handle setting up and managing the help yourself tables - thank you both. Cherie Raub and Rochelle Koenig unpack the freezers and oversee the meat distribution – thank you both. On distribution day, the "bread crew" makes a run to Giant and Fresh Market to pick up donations of bread and baked goods. Thank you to Steve and Mar Grimes and Donna and Keith Polizzano. Once back to the pantry, it is sorted and distributed to the patrons while they wait their turn in line inside the church. Thank you to Kellianna Bradstreet and to Mary and Dan Fitzgerald for your help. We continue to pick up bread and baked goods at Giant on non-distribution weeks and distribute it around Coopersburg. Thank you to Deb and Dean Stover for handling this. A special thank you to Stephanie Shapiro who checks the food pantry answering machine. While this may not sound like a big deal, she sometimes gets six or more calls a day about food assistance, donations or volunteering, all which needed to be addressed. Thank you to Stephanie. Some families cannot make it on Saturday, so we have a special pickup on Wednesday night. A big thank you to Tracy Zapach and Beth Carey for meeting the families. Once a month, all of the data needs to be compiled into a report for Second Harvest. Thank you to Beth Carey for taking on this important task and for doing an awesome job with it. Anne Nichols is our "thank you" volunteer who sends out a personal thank you letters whenever the need arises. In 2022, Anne sent 103 letters. Thank you, Anne, for continuing to help with this. As a small sign of appreciation, a pizza party was given for all the volunteers. Thank you to the Thode family for donating money to pay for everything. During this past year, we estimate over 150 volunteers have helped in one way or another. Thank you all! DONATIONS Throughout the year, Betty Lou's Pantry receives monetary donations from various individuals, organizations and the 12 covenant churches. Here is a recap of 2022. Organizations - \$4,241 Churches - \$2,353 Individuals -\$44,485 Businesses – \$12,576 Giant gift cards - \$5,766 Second Harvest grants -10,964 Fresh Market - 238 PayPal through bettylouspantry.com - 10,985.55 In Kind - \$985 With the huge outpouring of financial support we continue to receive from the community, each patron received a \$25 Giant gift card each month. Thank you to Donna Martonik for picking up the donations at the Center Valley post office and Southern Lehigh library and to Marybeth O'Neill for picking up at the Coopersburg post office. Thanks also to Tim Talaber for picking up prior to the Wednesday stocking day. We receive an enormous amount of community food

donations which sometimes requires trips 2-3 times per week.
